A MESSAGE FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Friends,

The Hymn of Promise by Natalie Sleeth (1930-1992)
*In the bulb there is a flower, in the seed, an apple tree,
in cocoons, a hidden promise: butterflies will soon be free!
In the cold and snow of winter there's a spring that waits to be,
unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.*

*There's a song in every silence, seeking word and melody;
there's a dawn in every darkness, bringing hope to you and me.
From the past will come the future; what it holds, a mystery,
unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.*

*In our end is our beginning, in our time, infinity;
in our doubt there is believing, in our life, eternity,
in our death, a resurrection, at the last, a victory,
unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see.*

Natalie Sleeth's music is often included in our worship services through congregational responses and choir anthems. An accomplished composer of the 20th century, Sleeth is well-known for two anthems, *Joy in the Morning* (our choir will sing this on May 4) and *Hymn of Promise*. She dedicated the latter to her husband in 1985, who died weeks after the anthem premiered. She wrote these words as she pondered the resurgence of spring every year.

I recently read these words at the memorial for Pat Miller. It was one of Pat's favorite hymns because she loved flowers, loved being in God's creation, and celebrating the newness of life! These were appropriate words for Pat's memorial on Holy Saturday, as we prepared to sing the Easter alleluias!

Natalie Sleeth gives us the hope that we receive from our risen Lord! This promise is for us now, not just something we will receive in the next life. Sleeth drew on the familiar words of the great poet T.S. Eliot (1888-1965): ***In the end is my beginning.***

We are constantly faced with endings and beginnings. This will soon be the case for young men and women as they graduate from high school or college. This is the case for families who grieve the death of a loved one, but eagerly anticipate the birth of a child. This the case as we move from one season to another. As Sleeth reminds us, the past will give way to the future that is filled with so many unknowns. Let us trust in the God who can see the possibilities that are ahead of us! Let us embrace the mysteries of life! Let us cling to the hidden promises of God!

CONSISTORY HIGHLIGHTS by Bob Kilgore

Key Decisions & Approvals:

- Treasurer's Report: March was financially strong—\$26,000 improvement in cash, \$21,000 gain for the month, YTD gain of \$18,000. Preschool also reported a gain.
- Board and committee reports were reviewed and approved.

Committee Highlights:

- Preschool is focused on enrollment for the next year; a new staff member will join.
- Christian Education is struggling with only two members; committee on hiatus. Board of Elders will take over responsibilities.
- Evangelism had a successful Welcome Dinner.
- Parish Life is organizing Easter breakfast and the church picnic.

Deacons:

- Memorial Garden idea being explored. A task force has been identified (Lon Wible, Mike Wagner, Zach Baynard, George DeLong, Rev. Jack Esbenshade, and Pastor Rankin).
- Sexton duties updated and approved.
- IT Committee may assist with tech training/checklists.

Pastor's/Elders Report:

- Policy review for weddings and funerals ongoing.
- Pastoral care and updated membership contacts being managed.
- Visioning process continues, with an emphasis on filling vacancies and evaluating our governance structure. Since Christian Education Committee is down to 2 people, Elders will now oversee Christian Education.
- Strong connections with other congregations noted (e.g., Zion Lutheran attending our Lenten services and Hamilton Park U.C.C. attending our Maundy Thursday service).
- Staff vacation schedules shared.

New Business:

- Pam Weeber approved as new Deacon for an unexpired term (2024-2027)

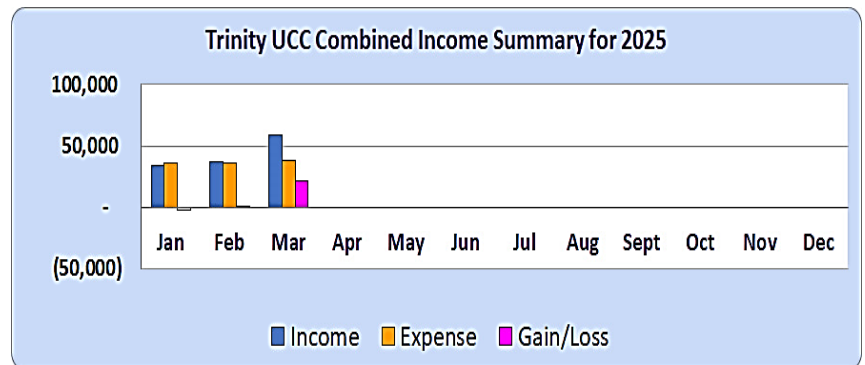

For several years, members have been able to make weekly/recurring donations on-line in lieu of paying cash/checks or by mail. On-line donations save the cost of a check and envelope and if using the recurring feature, remembering weekly to prepare your envelope. Presently we have several individuals/families using on-line donations either weekly or recurring.

*We believe that financial transparency builds trust and is a mark of stewardship so we want to take a moment to remind you that there is a small cost for this convenience. You'll have the opportunity to help cover the cost of processing when you give. Please know that this is **100% optional**, but we appreciate your partnership in making your gift go as far as possible to impact our mission.*

We have never asked our members to cover these costs especially since 2020 at the start of the pandemic. The costs are 1.05% when paying by check, 3.05% when paying by credit/debit card.

In 2022, we added a feature to our on-line giving whereby you can help to cover the costs of paying online by debit/credit card or checking account. This is entirely **OPTIONAL**. There will be a check-off block to use if you wish to cover your transaction cost in addition to your contribution.

TREASURE IN CLAY JARS by Rev. Jack Esbenshade

I admit that I spend some time sitting at my laptop and I surf the net. MSN's face sheet will feature articles intended to catch one's attention. And I am often drawn to those articles about my generation. The other day there was one entitled "Things That Will End With the Baby Boomers."

I opened the article and read the list of things that will cease to be in the near future. That list included – landline telephones, cable tv, printed newspapers, fax machines, photo albums and fine china.

No surprise there. Except for the newspaper, those are things that I have jettisoned or don't hold dearly. For our children and grandchildren, they've already seen the end of things like tape recorders and floppy disks.

The same could be said for our grandparents. Born before the turn of the 20th century, they saw and experienced the end of the horse drawn carriage, the modernization of indoor plumbing and refrigeration and the onset of air travel. Every generation experiences new things and the demise of the old.

With or without us, life goes on. We are not the center of the universe. The world continues to rotate on its axis. The sun rises in the east. And plant and animal life are sustained in spite of us.

Two questions I would pose for your reflection. One – what are those things, characteristics that have staying power – what is it about human existence that endures and makes it through transitions? I would posit that love, trust, integrity, honor, generosity and faithfulness are a few of those things.

The second is not so much a question but an affirmation. I believe that it is through the loving intervention of God in Jesus Christ that we can celebrate that our lives go on.

Christ is Risen – He is Risen Indeed.

CHURCH GIVING CARDS: Since some members give online or on a monthly basis, they don't have anything to place in the offering plate during worship. Pastor Rankin recently shared with the Consistory an idea that he received from a church he visited for a concert. A Message from Christian Education for May-June

“.. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, ‘To an unknown god.’ What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For ‘In him we live and move and have our being’; as even some of your own poets have said, ‘For we too are his offspring.’” (Acts 17: 23-28, NRSVUE)

The Apostle Paul uses this unknown god as a stand-in for the true God, that although He is unknown to the Greeks, He desires to be known by them. Paul explains that the true God is the real power behind all life.

During the Sundays in May Christian Education Classes will be meeting at 9:00 am through Sunday, June 1st.

The Children’s Class will be continuing work with SPARK! in the downstairs Sunday School room as we explore additional opportunities in which to engage our children. Youth and adults are invited to join The Wired Word studies with Diane Rice meeting in the Choir Room, or in a study of Adam Hamilton’s The Call – The Life and Message of the Apostle Paul led by Pastor Chris, Sue Bowman and others in Isenberg Hall. Hamilton’s study invites us to hear Paul’s story and message, and to reflect on God’s call in our lives to become the people we are meant to be. Chapter 5, “Called to Give” will be starting May 11th. April 27th and May 4th, at 9:00 am in Isenberg Hall, we are pleased to invite the congregation to hear the Rev. 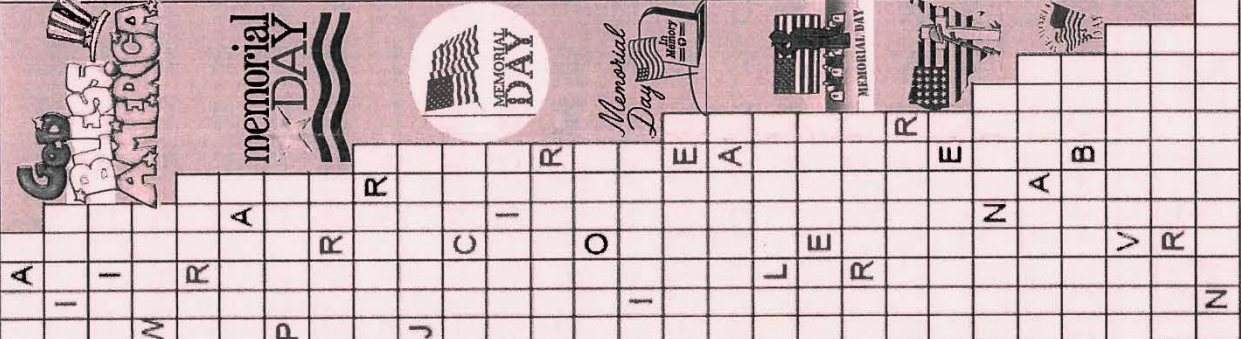

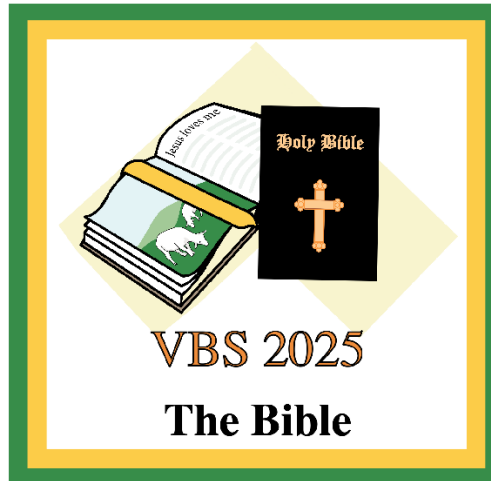
